

NOTES

Note 1

Novice Definition - an exhibitor who has yet to win three first place ribbons in the Decorative Design division in major shows (i.e. our annual show, District 15 AGM and/or OHA convention)

Note 2

Parallel Design - a design in which three or more groupings are placed in a parallel manner with open spaces between the groupings. Parallel direction may be vertical, horizontal or diagonal. Design is in one container or containers combined so as to appear as one unit.

(Hint – Tulips may require conditioning before use)

Note 3

Waterviewing Design – Usually a design in a shallow container with one-half to two-thirds of the container surface showing water.

Note 4

Miniature design – a design that is less than 5” but preferably smaller. (1”-3”)

MONTHLY FLOWER SHOW RULES



1. The decision of the judges is final.
2. Entries must be in place by 7:45 PM SHARP.
3. No awards will be made for mediocre exhibits.
4. Exhibitors must be members of the Brampton Horticultural Society.
5. Exhibitors are responsible for the correctness of their entry cards.
6. Once judging has commenced, no exhibitor may move his or her exhibit. After judging, exhibits may be moved by officials to give a more pleasing aspect to the show.
7. Horticultural specimens must be grown by the exhibitor.
8. Horticultural specimens should be named if possible and must be shown with their own foliage (unless otherwise stated).
9. Potted plants must be in the possession of the exhibitor for two months prior to the show.
10. Flowerpots not to exceed 10" in diameter, unless otherwise stated.
11. Exhibitors are permitted up to two entries of different cultivars from one household in a class, unless otherwise stated.
12. When a quantity of specimen or bloom is stated, no more or less may be exhibited.
13. Vases for the Horticultural classes will be supplied and must be used unless otherwise stated.
14. Wiring, tying or staking will disqualify cut bloom exhibits in the Horticultural classes but are permitted in all potted plants except African Violets.
15. All decorative designs are to be the work of the exhibitor.
16. Unless otherwise specified, some fresh plant material must be used in all decorative design classes, and may be obtained from any source (i.e. does not have to be grown by the exhibitor). Natural materials such as decorative foliage, driftwood, rocks, moss and evergreens may be used; and painted branches and treated materials, used with discretion. Accessories are permitted, but artificial plant material is not. Soil is not permitted in Decorative Design Classes.
17. Any arrangement calling for fruits and/or vegetables must contain some flora/foliage material.
18. Points are awarded as follows: 1st place - 5 points, 2nd place - 3 points, 3rd place - 2 points, Honorable Mention - 1 point, Judge's Choice, if awarded - 5 points, and 1 point for each show entry.

October 23, 2018

HORTICULTURAL: 2 entries permitted in all horticultural classes if different cultivars

1. Ornamental Grass – 3 stems, same cultivar in your own container
2. Branch or vine – maximum 30" above vase
 - a) with berries
 - b) showing fall colours
3. Any annual – 1 stem
4. Any perennial – 1 stem
5. Any bulb, corm, tuber or rhizome – 1 stem
6. Plate of any 3 – same variety
 - a) small vegetables on own plate
 - b) small fruit on own plate
7. Plate with one large vegetable

DECORATIVE DESIGN "You CAN Do It"

8. Design in a small can e.g. soup/vegetable
9. Design in a large can e.g. coffee/juice
10. Design in any decorative tin e.g. biscuit/tea
11. Design in a tuna can – a small design at least 5" but not more than 10"

NOVICE (see Note 1)

12. Design in a beer/pop can

EDUCATIONAL

13. The purpose of this category is to EDUCATE. Therefore, the exhibit must include a display card that includes, at a minimum, the history, description and growing conditions required.

This category can earn up to 5 points as follows:

- Quality of exhibit - 40%
- Growing Conditions (sun, soil, water, etc.) - 20%
- Description (height, spread, colour, etc.) - 20%
- History (where did the species originate, how used, etc.) - 20%

September 25, 2018

HORTICULTURAL: 2 entries permitted in all horticultural classes if different cultivars

1. Rose a) 1 bloom
b) 1 spray
2. Rose – in full bloom floating in a clear bowl
3. Any daisy-like flower – 1 stem
 - a) annual
 - b) perennial
4. Any other annual – 1 stem
5. Any other perennial - 1 stem
6. Tomatoes – 3 of same variety on your own plate

DECORATIVE DESIGN “Bottoms Up”

7. Coffee Break – a design in a coffee cup
8. Happy Hour – a design in a wine or martini glass
9. Hot Soup – a design in a soup mug/bowl
10. At the Pub – a design in a beer mug

NOVICE (see Note 1)

11. Tea Time – a design in a teacup

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- Description (height, spread, colour, etc.) - 20%
- History (where did the species originate, how used, etc.) - 20%

March 27, 2018

HORTICULTURAL: 2 entries permitted in all horticultural classes if different cultivars

1. Forced bulb or bulbs in a single container
2. A trailing houseplant – maximum 10” pot
3. Houseplant grown for bloom - maximum 10” pot
4. Houseplant grown for foliage – maximum 10” pot
5. African Violet – single crown
6. Any other Gesneriad
7. A plant grown from a cutting propagated no more than 12 months ago

DECORATIVE DESIGN “For The Reader”

8. Design suggesting a romantic theme
9. Design suggesting a spy theme
10. Design suggesting a murder/mystery theme
11. Design suggesting your favourite character (name the character)

NOVICE (see Note 1)

12. Design suggesting a sci/fi theme

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- Description (height, spread, colour, etc.) - 20%
- History (where did the species originate, how used, etc.) - 20%

April 24, 2018

HORTICULTURAL: 2 entries permitted in all horticultural classes if different cultivars

1. Tulip – 1 stem with or without foliage
 - a) small
 - b) large
2. Daffodil/Narcissus – 1 stem without foliage
3. Assortment of small spring flowers (5-10 stems) in your own container - maximum height 5"
4. Group of four seedlings (grown from seed, same cultivar)
 - a) vegetable or herb
 - b) flower

DECORATIVE DESIGN "Ode to the Bloom"

5. "The Rose" – a design using a single rose
6. "Bed of Roses" – a design using multiple roses
7. "Tiptoe Through the Tulips" – a parallel design using tulips (see Note 2)
8. "Field of Gold" - a design using only yellow flowers (and foliage)

NOVICE (see Note 1)

9. "Fresh as a Daisy" – a design (preview from the Annual Flower Show)

EDUCATIONAL

10. The purpose of this category is to EDUCATE. Therefore, the exhibit must include a display card which includes, at a minimum, the history, description and growing conditions required.

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- Quality of exhibit - 40%
- Growing Conditions (sun, soil, water, etc.) - 20%
- Description (height, spread, colour, etc.) - 20%
- History (where did the species originate, how used, etc.) - 20%

May 22, 2018

HORTICULTURAL: 2 entries permitted in all horticultural classes if different cultivars

1. Fern – 1 frond
2. Iris – 1 stem
3. Allium – 1 stem
4. Columbine – 1 stem
5. Hosta – a collection of 3 leaves all same cultivar in own container
6. Flowering Branch – maximum 30" above vase
 - a) lilac
 - b) other

DECORATIVE DESIGN "Summertime"

7. Sit Back – a design in a patio chair
8. Gone Fishing – a waterviewing design (see Note 3)
9. At the Beach – a design
10. She Sells Seashells – a miniature design in a seashell (preview of a similar miniature design from the Annual Flower Show) (see Note 4)

11. Anchors Away – a design suggesting a nautical theme

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
